## =<u>THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL</u>= Lesson 10 The Brazen Serpent

<u>AIM</u>: to help my class to see Jesus in the plan of salvation as presented in this Old Testament Scripture, Numbers 21:5-9.

<u>POINT OF CONTACT</u>: Ask, "How many of you have ever had a 'run-in' with a snake? What kind of snake? Where?"

- I. <u>THE SIN THAT CAUSED THE SERPENTS</u>. See Numbers 21:5.
  - 1. <u>We find the Israelites complaining again</u>. They forgot what happened when they complained and begged for flesh (Numbers 11) and when they complained at Kadesh-barnea (Numbers 13 and 14).
  - 2. They complained that their being in the wilderness was because of Moses and the Lord.
  - 3. <u>They despised the manna that God provided in the morning</u>. This was a serious charge, for they were accusing God of either not loving them or of being incapable of supplying their needs.
  - 4. <u>The best way to keep from despising God's gifts to us is never allow them to become even commonplace</u>. We need to thank the Lord every day for salvation, soul-winning power, etc. In I Corinthians 10:9-11 we learn that these things happened to the Jews to warn us.

## II. <u>THE SUFFERING THAT RESULTED</u>. Read Numbers 21:6.

- 1. <u>The Lord sent fiery serpents</u>. Deuteronomy 8:15 teaches that the serpents were there all the time. Therefore, God simply withheld His protection at this time.
- 2. <u>The Jews learned again that we reap what we sow</u>. Just as surely as day follows night, we must reap what we sow. See Galatians 6:7.
- 3. <u>It did not matter whether these Israelites were rich or poor, educated or uneducated, high or low on the social ladder</u>. The only thing that mattered was that they had experienced a fatal snake bite.
- 4. Each one of us has suffered from snakebite, Genesis 3; Romans 5:12.

## III. THE SALVATION THAT GOD PROVIDED.

- 1. <u>The people confessed their sin and did it in definite terms</u>, Numbers 21:7.
- 2. <u>Moses prayed for them</u>. Moses was probably a much better Christian than most of us in this matter.
- At God's command, Moses made a serpent of brass. This serpent pictures Jesus Himself. See John 3:14, 15. Brass pictures judgment, and Jesus was judged on the cross for our sins. See II Corinthians 5:21.
- 4. <u>The serpent was placed on a pole, which pictures the cross</u>, Numbers 21:8, 9.
- 5. Notice that "every one" (verse 8) and "any man" (verse 9) could be healed.
- 6. <u>Any poor snakebitten Israelite could be saved by looking to the serpent on the pole</u>. Today any poor sinner may be saved by looking to Jesus.
- 7. The Israelites were healed in the same way that sinners are saved today—"by grace through faith."
- 8. <u>The brazen serpent was not Jesus</u>. It only pictured Him. Yet in later years it had to be destroyed because the Jews were offering incense to it. See II Kings 18:4. Many people today "offer incense" to baptism, the Lord's Supper, and other things that only picture Jesus.
